Award Winner: City of Milwaukee, Wisconsin

Description of Community:

Nestled on the coast of Lake Michigan, Milwaukee is a city abuzz with growth that also holds fast to its heritage. Founded in 1845, Milwaukee is a big city with a small town feel, thanks to its unique neighborhoods and engaged residents working together to promote quality of life for all ages. Milwaukee is the largest municipality within Milwaukee County and is bounded by Lake Michigan and the suburbs of Milwaukee, Ozaukee, and Waukesha Counties.

Eastman is a naturally occurring, intergenerational community in the dynamic Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region of New Hampshire. When economic growth brought jobs and young families to Eastman, it evolved from a retirement and seasonal recreational community to a fullblown intergenerational community with a wonderful blend of families, retirees and vacationers. 83% of Eastman's 3700 acres are in the town of Grantham; the remainder is evenly split between Enfield and Springfield.
